

Using the Creative Process Framework to Plan Arts Integration Units

Katie Gill-Harvey and Genie Arnot, Social Studio

People often think of the creative process as something that happens in the art classroom but the creative process is a framework that can be used in any space to help students become creative problem solvers. Teaching students creative problem solving skills is one of the core components of any arts integrated lesson, making the Creative Process Framework the perfect tool for planning and preparing arts integrated lessons. The 6 phases of the Creative Process Framework: Explore, Engage, Express, Expand, Exchange & Empower, facilitate and support idea development, creative problem solving, communication, and personal expression. Participants in this workshop will explore the 6 phases of Creative Process Framework and learn how they can use this framework with their students to empower them to become creative problem solvers.

Looking at Art in the Classroom

Rebecca Shulman, Musuem Questions Consulting Room 336

How and why might you incorporate looking at art into your classroom? This workshop briefly shares 2006 research that demonstrated that specific methodologies for looking at art with students improved third-grade students' critical thinking skills related to literacy. It will then model inquiry with a work of art, engaging participants in a facilitated, thematic conversation around a work of art exploring a social-studies-related topic. The rest of the time will take participants through the work of creating their own inquiry – selecting an object that supports their learning goals for students, crafting questions that teach both content and critical thinking skills, and considering when and how to weave in information. Before the 80 minutes is up a few participants will have the opportunity to try their lesson with the group, and we will co-create a list of effective practices in using this methodology in their classrooms.

Arts Integration Partnerships and Resources

Arts Integration School Partnerships: School-wide Arts Integration Partner Schools work collaboratively with Arts Every Day's Arts Integration Schools Manager to set arts integration goals for the school year and use a combination of professional development, school-based support, and AED-provided grant funding to help meet those goals. This close partnership

model aims to provide schools with direct support to reach arts integration goals that are authentic to each school's community. The application window for School Partnership during SY24/25 has passed, but keep an eye on our School Partnership page for the SY25/26 application to launch this spring!



Arts Integration Educator Partnerships: Arts Integration Educator Partners will join a cohort of passionate educators from across the district who will work collaboratively to grow their arts integration teaching practice through a series of virtual PLCs throughout the school year.

Arts Integration Educator Partners will receive priority access to up to \$2,500 to use towards student arts experiences booked through our Arts Directory. Applications for Arts Integration Educator Partners are being accepted through August 30th! Learn more and apply here.



Baltimore Arts Integration Project: The Baltimore Arts Integration Project seeks to transform teaching practice in Baltimore City Public Schools (BCPSS) by providing high-quality, multi-faceted professional development and ready-to-use arts integration resources based on district curriculum. This work is guided by the groundbreaking research in neuroeducation by Dr. Mariale Hardiman, founder of the Brain-Targeted Teaching Model and director of the Johns Hopkins Neuro-Education Initiative. Through this

project, collaborative teams of talented artists and educators are creating a library of accessible asynchronous arts integration resources tied directly to BCPSS curriculum. BCPSS educators can access all resources by creating a free account through our online learning platform, Thinkific.

FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

The following funding opportunities from Arts Every Day are open to all Baltimore City Public Schools:

Arts Experiences Fund: All Baltimore City Public Schools are eligible to apply for up to \$2,500 in funding to support student arts experiences booked through AED's Arts Directory, including field trips, performances, and teaching artist residencies. The first grant application window will be open August 19-November 22nd; applications will be reviewed on a rolling basis throughout the grant window.



Arts Equipment Fund: All Baltimore City Public Schools are eligible to apply for up to \$5,000 in funding to support the purchase of non-consumable arts equipment. The Arts Equipment Fund application opened on August 2nd; applications are reviewed on a rolling basis throughout the school year.



ADVOCACY OPPORTUNITIES

Baltimore Youth Arts Advocacy Council (BYAAC): BYAAC provides a platform for youth creatives in grades 10-12 to learn about and impact school policymaking. Youth council members meet with local and state leaders to demystify what the school board does, who its members are and how they, as students, can be actively involved in the decision making processes that put arts education programs at risk.



Baltimore Advocates for Arts Education (BA4AE): advocates for increased and more equitable access to arts education for students in Baltimore City Public Schools. BA4AE is a community of stakeholders that includes the parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles, siblings, cousins, friends, and neighbors of students who attend schools within the Baltimore City Public School District. We are looking to build a base of volunteers who are willing to be involved in some way with our efforts to restore arts education into the curriculum as a core discipline in our public schools.
